By the age of 20, Show Dog – Universal Music's Joel Crouse has already accomplished more than many artists ever dream of doing.

He wrote his first song at the age of 14, started a band when he was 15, graduated from high school at the age of 16, and was signed to his record deal not long after his 19th birthday. He has o pened shows for Toby Keith, Darius Rucker, Rodney Atkins, Sara Evans, and Goo Goo Dolls.

Crouse and his grandfather share a strong bond, which is where his love for country music began. His grandfather lived with his family off and on throughout his childhood and, during that time, Crouse was introduced to the music of Johnny Cash, Hank Williams Jr., Waylon Jennings, Willie Nelson, and Merle Haggard.

Crouse also grew to love classic rock music from the '7 Os, particularly story songs like those performed by Lynyrd Skynyrd, The Eagles, and Fleetwood Mac, to name a few. At the young age of 20, Crouse is an old soul who loves the classics and thinks there's no better sound than listening to a vinyl recording.

In a world where every single is the biggest hit, every song the best one ever, Neal McCoy has had his share of feel-good radio records, a few meaningful ballads, the BMI Song of the Year with "Wink" and "The Shake," and a whole lot of fun. But he's spent almost two decades chasing "that song."

With "A-OK," the song that co-producer Blake Shelton found for the entertainer from Longview, TX, McCoy's quest may be over. With its bouncing beat, bright melody, and yes, pure Andy Griffith whistle, the song about seeing the glass as hal ffull and the smile upside down in a frown, along with the B arry Dean/Luke Laird/Brett Eldridge mid-tempo, is the p erfect distillation of McCoy's always effervescent show.

"I think any song that says 'It's gonna be okay, it's gonna be alright ...' an d feels like this one does, has got to be a winner. People really wanna hear, and almost need to hear, that right now . . . times being the way they are, an d something that makes people feel good? Well, anyone who knows me knows I'm all about that," McCoy said.

Ask anyone about Neal McCoy, the p erennial Winstock fan-favorite (he has been at Winstock '98, '01, '05, and '09), and they may not be able to name all of the s ongs, but they'll go on and on about his live concerts: full-tilt celebrations of music, life, laughter, joy, and his number-one hits. But don't make it ab out Neal McCoy – he sure wouldn't.

"I think when people come to see you, sure, they want to hear your music," he said. "But they really wanna be somewhere that makes 'em forget their troubles for a little bit; to have some fun, to laugh and remember how good life can be. I always say,

they're not fans . . . they're friends, and I want 'em to have a good time."

Modesty aside, McCoy has sold over six million albums, done 15 USO tours, and established the East Texas Angel Network 17 years ago for children with life-threatening illnesses, helping over 400 families along the way.

His entrance into the country music world was championed by Hall of Famer Charley Pride, and his latest offering is being orchestrated by past Winstock headliner Blake Shelton, and Miranda Lambert of the Pastol Annies. People like that know music – and performing. Those who came before and those who're now setting the standard both recognize how special McCoy's kind of country is.

Or as Shelton himself said, "The only thing that blows me away more than Neal McCoy in concert is the fact he asked me to be involved in making his new album... I'm honored to work with a hero of mine."

It began on a wild hair: two girlfriends on a giddy whim, calling a third gal lat e one night with an invitation to join the fun and maybe start a little trouble – and a band.

"I thought they were in slumb er-party mode," recalls Angaleena Presley of that midnigh t call she got several years ago from her friend, fellow Nashville-basedsinger-songwriterAshleyMonroe. Monroe wanted Presley to e-mail every song she had immediately because she "and Miranda" had hatched a plan to put a band together and they wanted her on board.

"I was lik e, 'Girls, you're going to wake up tomorrow and realize y ou're stupid," Presley continues. "And then I went, 'Miranda who?' And Ashley says, 'Lambert!' That's when I was like, 'Oh ... better get out of bed right now!"

Between the two of them, Presley and Monroe (from Kentucky and Tennessee, respectively) had landed a handful of cuts working Nashville's Music Row for the better part of the last decade.

Monroe had also worked on projects with famed indie-rocker/producer Jack White and released a major-label debut, while Presley has an exceptional album of her own waiting for a proper home. Lambert, meanwhile, has been one of country music's biggest stars with three successive number one albums: 2005's Kerosene, 2007's Crazy Ex-Girlfriend and 2009's Revolution. Four the R ecord has continued the hot streak. Monroe actually co-wrote two songs with Lambert for Revolution, including the chart-topping single "Heart Like Mine."

They debuted their new single, "Hush Hush" on "The Today Show" May 7.

Although the stakes are higher for "Annie Up," the trio has a s ense of peace about their second record, which came out May 7.

"Annie Up" features 12 new tracks, all written by the sassy trio. The album opens with "I Feel A Sin Comin' On," an old-fashioned cabaret-style song.

"We love this song and hope people blush when they hear it," Monroe said.

Pistol Annies have the ability to speak to and for their audience, especially their female fans. Those fans are bound to make a sing-along anthem out of "Girls Like Us," a song the Annies w rote for all the women in their lives.

"We're three girls with three different lives and three different points-of-view, but really, if you get a group of women in a room and you talk about problems, everybody's gonna yell out 'amens' and have stories to tell," Lambert said.

Their uniquely country, yet contemporary viewpoints connect them with country's tradition of truth-telling. "But, I m ean, we're not doing anything new. Loretta Lynn did it way before we did," said Presley.

"We're just doing it for our generation, bringing it back home," said Lambert. Pistol Annies style!

In the fall of 2010, Dierks Bentley played four shows in four nights in New York City that illustrate just how unique he is among contemporary country music artists.

First, Bentley, the multi-platinum arena headliner, played his hits at the Bowery Ballroom. Then Bentley, the bluegrass student and devotee, performed with the Del McCoury Band; and after that, it was a songwriter's night with fellow Music Row tunesmiths, and a show with Chris Thile's experimental Punch Brothers. Probably no other artist on country radio in the past ten years could manage this kind of range and versatility.

Especially when one considers the broader record. He's had eight number-one singles and written every one of them. His instantly recognizable voice and acoustic/electric hybrid sound have propelled him to membership in the Grand Ole Opry and, in 2011, a performance for the president at the White House. All made possible by his devotion to developing all sides of his musicianship. Bentley has embraced musical diversity in his recording career as well, as his album "Home" demonstrates.

The project plunges him back into the country mainstream after a successful sojourn in bluegrass and roots music with the acclaimed and Grammynominated "Up On The Ridge" album.

"I definitely stepped away from the commercial country world for a little while," Bentley said, noting that his last such album, "Feel That Fire," came out in early 2009.

But if there's newness, there's also a dis tinct familiarity about how Bentley and his musi c are connecting with fans. This sixth album of his Capitol Records Nashville career produced a numb er-one hit even before its release.

That album-opening song, "Am I The Only One," is a rallying cry to the fun-loving Bentley army. And it

sets a tone – a g ood-time song kicking off a good-time record. Plus, the title track, "Home," gives the mostly light-hearted album a vital, spiritual anchor. The song expresses pride and patriotism without sentimentality or illusions.

Dierks Bentley's career in country music could be taught in music business classes because of its rare balance of commercial success and artistic breadth.

"I walk a different path," Bentley said. "Because of my love of acoustic music, I have opportunities to do different musical things."

Throughout this journey (and critical to it), Bentley has sought out and made use of technologies that could help erase the distance between himself and his fans. He's done things his own way, satisfied his own muses, and done all he can do to bring all kinds of fans along with him. There's every reason to think they'll follow him Home, and to Winstock, too.



Three musicians and a songwriting friend were toying with a fiddle riff, just to see where it might lead. It became the hook for a song, and once they launched into the "Home Sweet Home" chorus, the three voices fell into place with an unexpected, other-worldly sound.

Instant harmony. Almost-instant band.

The Farm is in man y ways a hybrid act – a trio deeply rooted in country music, that folds in sonic elements from a variety of popular-music genres - but the core is built around a solid, identifiable vocal harmony.

Interlocking voices have been an important thread in country's history, from the Sons of the Pioneers through Alabama through Restless Heart through Lady Antebellum. The Farm – featuring Minnesota's own Nick Hoffman, Damien Horne, and Krista Marie - p uts its own distinct spin on the sound, a tightly woven mesh that relies on the synthesis of three musicians who found their way to Nashville from different parts of the U S with different sets of musical influences.

The Farm's unified blend is an aural representation of the melting-pot mentality at the heart of America.

"There are a lot of bands out there that you could take a member out and not know the difference," Hoffman, the fiddle-playing singer, said. "This is not one of those bands."

"It's really three elements that y ou bring together," Krista added. "Like earth, wind, fire and there we are."

The Farm's first album demonstrates the various musical sources at work. The crunchy chords in "Fresh Off the Farm" pull from classic rock. "Be Grateful" relies on pop melodicism. And "Farm Party" builds on a hip -hop counter-hook and a rhythmic center that's old-school R&B at its heart.

Despite the outside influences, The Farm is clearly a country project, built from heartland values, Nick's snarling fiddle, and those intense harmonies created by three distinct solo voices.

It's a bold, edgy mix that dares to be different and, for The Farm, that daring sound is a fundamental part of the trio's makeup. Nick was a country traditionalist, Krista was a former solo vocalist with a background in opera and standards, and Damien had first moved to Nashville with an alt ernativerock band and ended up o pening concerts for R&B artist John Legend.

"It was just about making music and building this chemistry and growing, but it wasn't even like we were after a deal or anything like that," Damien said. "We were in the same head space, we were just making music, and a b unch of things jus t kinda came about because the music was good."

The Farm was signe d to the W arner Music Nashville's Elektra Records, and the b and approached the first album with a fo cused dedication that's more like a rock band than the typical Music Row recording process.

'We wrote like a b and, and we re corded like a band," Nick e xplains. There was ev olution and experimenting, things that wouldn't have happened if we had done it any other way."

The world of Sa wyer Brown is filled with dirt roads, small towns, little thrills, tiny moments, and intimate connections ... but mos tly, it's about recognition of how major those things really can be: everyday people seeing themselves in each other, the five men onstage and their songs.

For the Apopka, Florida-bred band, these are songs of the c ommon man de livered without mercy, only a relentless commitment to the freedom and fun that only a night out among good friends can allow.

"We came out of the notion we were there to entertain people, to make sure everybody had a good time," concedes creative catalyst Mark Miller, known as much for his hyperkinetic performances as for writing "Some Girls Do," "The Dirt Road," "Hard To Say," "Step That Step," "This Time," and "The Boys and Me."

"You're looking at a bunch of blue collar people here, who were raised to put the work in, to make sure the p eople are s atisfied and who really love being on that stage and seeing the people letting it all go," Miller added. "Somebody once told me 'If you can't have fun at a Sawyer Brown show, you can't have fun...' I don't know, but it would sure be nice if it was true."

After more than 20 years, 3,500+ shows, gold and platinum albums, a smattering of a wards, and more long odds than any act you can think of, Sawyer Brown remains a band you can count on. Never ones to get above their raising, they have a deep appreciation for the heart of small towns, rural realities, lives lived in c ommon places and truths so basic they go unnoticed.

But along the way, while all kinds of acts were racing by and then falling, Miller and company were amassing a string of hits that defined the worldview of regular people living between the coasts – people ignored by the media mongers and tastemakers. Those hits carry over onstage.

"The energy on stage is what keeps the fans coming back – and their energy is part of what keeps us rocking so hard . . . and we only rock harder as the night goes on," said drummer Joe Smyth. "After an hour and a haf, we're slamming harder than when we hit the stage, and it just feels incredible."

In addition to Miller, Sawyer Brown is Greg "Hobie" Hubbard, Jim Scho Iten, Smyth, and Shayne Hill.

After more than thre e decades together, 38 Special continues to bring their signature blast of southern rock to more than 100 cities a year. And at each and ev ery show, thousands of audience members are amazed by the explosive power of the band's performance.

Singer-songwriter Kip Moore explored his own experiences of gro wing up in a small Georgia town and working diligently for years to achieve his music al dreams to create his MCA Nashville debut album, "Up All Night."

The album p oetically captures those unforgettable coming-of-age moments, especially for those longing for a life beyond a small town's borders, as well as the roller coaster of love and heartbreak at any age. He delivers these hones t and de eply personal lyrics with a gravelly voice weathered by life's detours and disappointments and strengthened by his dreams and un yielding determination.

"For years, I ha ve been searching for the missing link b etween blue-collar rock and country music," said noted journalist/historian Robert K. Oermann, who writes for Music Row magazine. "This year, I think I have heard it. His name is Kip Moore. There is fiery, urgent intensity in his voice. His lyrics vibrate with conviction and true grit . The melodies have gripping, hear t-in-throat passion. And the roaring, propulsive performances on his debut album sound lik e signposts on the highway to some Sout hern-fried Born to Run. Dare I say it? This man just might be the hillbilly Springsteen."

Moore, who had a hand in writing all 1 songs on the album, isn 't interested in depicting a fairy-tale kind of love.

"I am drawn to the real-life experiences between a woman and a man. I tr y to sing about the way it is, but yet at the same time, what you can hope for b etween a c ouple. I don't intend to paint a picture of what it's really not," Moore said.

"Up All Nigh t" reveals some of the contradictions that he grapples with personally. Although he's from a large family and enjoys musical c ollaborations and performing on stage, he's an introvert who is often more comfortable being alone.


Despite its edge, his music remain s desperately optimistic. "I am hoping for what I have yet to become," Moore said. "I feel like it's hopeful for what I've yet reached, how I look forward to feeling, but I ha ven't gotten there yet.

When Moore plays shows, he's often asked for advic e by aspiring songwrit ers. "Everybody's experience is different, but I do believe it has t o be the only thing, " he said. "I don't think it can be a gray line. Either you want it and there's nothing else, or it's not going to happen."

He drove to Nashville Jan. 1, 2004, in an old Nissan truck that contained one bag and his guitar. He immersed himself in the song -writing community, observing songwriters' rounds for two years and honing his craf t, before gaining the confidence to join in.

"I try to make my time in Nash ville mean something for the boys," he said.

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
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An interview with lead singer Don Barnes of 38 Special

The name 38 Special may not ring familiar with every country fan out there, however, once the band takes the W instock stage Saturday night, the group is sure to quickly win over the crowd.

"The line has been kind of blurred through the y ears," 38 Special lead singer D on Barnes said in a pre-Winstock interview.

He said a lot of today's country music acts have borrowed elements of sound and st yle from many of the southern rock

acts that have been around for decades (since 1976, in 38 Special's case).

"The crowd, because they've been exposed to that style and everything, it's not a problem," Barnes said about performing in a country lineup. "Before you know it, we've won them over. Our approach and big-time party attitude, and good, well-written, crafted songs, and we've got'em screaming at the end."

The band loves hearing people at the end of the night coming up and saying, "Man, I didn't know that was you."

With song titles like "Hold On Loosely," "Caught Up In You," "Rockin' Into the Night," "If I'd Been the One," and "Back Where You Belong," it won't take 38 Special long to fit right in on the Winstock stage.

With more than thre e decades performing together, and more than 1 00 live shows a year, the southern rockers are certainly no strangers to entertaining an audience.

"We are so fortunate to have these 15-16 top 40 songs over the years," Barnes said.

However as the band has moved into 2013, one familiar component of the group hasn 't been present on stage. Co-founder Donnie Van Zant has had to take some time away from the road due to inner-ear nerve damage.

"He's the one who wanted us to aim our amps at him," Barnes said with a laugh. "We angled the amps directly at him. He's paying the price for it now."

Barnes said Van Zant is "doing fine," and said that his do ctors have told him that, for the foreseeable future, he needs to step back from performing live to see how well the damage heals.

"He's our brother," Barnes said. "We certainly miss him. The show has always been a celebration of that brotherhood, and we send all our love

and best wishes to him."

Barnes said Van Zant has been doing some testing at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, and is continuing to write and be involved with the band off the road.

On the road, Barnes said the band has made adjustments to their stage setup now that Van Zant isn't on stage.

"Most people, over the y ears, don't quite identify with who's in the band – they just want to hear the songs," Barnes said. "We get up there and give 110 percent."

In addition to all of the traditional 3 8 Special hits, fans can also expect a medley showcasing the band's history.

"We always want to make sure people hear what they want to hear," Barnes said.

And, when performing live, they do n't try to reinvent their hits or do extended jams, like some artists do.


"We keep it clean so it sounds like the record," Barnes said.

"When we were k ids, we'd go see a band and they would jam on their hit song, like, 10 minutes and it didn't really sound like the song. Just do it like the record and get it over with," he said with a laugh.

Speaking of re cords, one B arnes and his bandmates – Danny Chauncey, bassist Larry "L.J." Junstrom, drummer G ary Moffatt, and keyboardist/vocalist Bobby Capps – are particularly proud of is their "3 8 Special – Live From Texas" album that was released a couple years ago.

He explained the band did a series of shows across Texas, and took their own recording equipment on the ro ad with them to capture the band's famous live sound.

"The original idea was just to have this CD available at the merch tables for people to take the party home with them as they were leaving,"

Barnes said.

When the b and got b ack off the road to its Atlanta studio, the groups tarted mixing and listening to what had b een recorded, and realized "we're a m uch better band than we thought we were," Barnes said.

The group was ab le to utilize t echnology advancements that have transpired since their last live offering, and Barness aid the Texas album makes a listener feel like they're right in front of the band.

In addition to continuing to promote the live album, Barnes said the group has thre e new projects in the works.

The first is an album of all new material, which Barnes said the group has about half complete.

"We're going back to the sounds of the '8 Os rock choruses, big melodies – we call it muscle and melody," he's aid. "It's a simp le formula that's worked all these years. If it isn't broke, don't fix it."

Barnes said the big thing is just trying to find the time to work on the project.

The second project the group has in the works is a re-working of some of their hits. He said this was a way for the band to keep the songs interesting.

"It's the same songs, just a more adventurous, different reading of some of these songs ," Barnes said, hoping the album will be released to fans this fall.

"Nobody's busting the door down looking for anything new, so we're just taking our time with it." Barnes said.

The third project the group is under taking is a project of movie soundtracks and songs. The band wrote and p erformed the hit "Trooper with an Attitude" for the movie Super Troopers, which came out in 2001, as well as some other music heard throughout the film.

"We enjoyed doing tha t," Barnes said. "We thought it was going to be much more laborious than it was, but it was a lot of fun."

Hit songs, fun projects, in addition to the full tour schedule, are what has held it all together for the band that has m ore than 20 million in sales for the last three-plus decades.

"The good thing, after all these years, and it's rare, but we all still like each other," Barnes said. Barnes said he is lo oking forward to the next few months of being out on the road.

"Summer has always been the blitz season for us," he said. "Everybody has a River Fest or Summer Fest, Bridge Fest ... there 's 20,000 people out there at each one. Parents grew up on the music and are bringing their kids.

"The great thing for us is when we see a group of 3 or 4 boys out there that might have a little band, high-fiving each other when a certain song comes on. They learned the music through Guitar Hero and Rock Band, and that reminds us of us. That was us back when we were that age, seeing Led Zeppelin for \$6. It's a big circle. That's always a lot of fun."

Barnes said one of the band's sound technicians is from Minnesota, and he said the group always enjoys playing in the state.

"We're looking forward to it," Barnes said. "It's always a good time."

The band works about seven months out of the year, and Barnes said everyone in the band has families and activities. His respite from the madness, traffic, and crowds is his boat.

There are plenty of lakes here in Minnesota Barnes may be able to be found on prior to or after his W instock appearance. However, the stage takes priority.

"It's a great job to bring that kind of joy to people every night," Barnes said. "We're able to get up there and crank a guitar up and be 19 years old again. We appreciate all the fans after all these years making us part of their lives."

This is a state-of-the-art weather-tracking machine that has a weather sensor, television roof satellite, and a large monitor in the back always tracking the weather.



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
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

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
