Location

WINSTOCK is located adjacent to the Winsted Airport in Winsted, Minnesota. Winsted is located approximately 35 miles west of Minneapolis. If you travel west on Highway 7, turn north on McLeod County Road 1 for three miles, then turn west on McLeod County Road 5 and follow the signs. If you travel west on Highway 12, turn south on Wright County Road 6 (east side of Howard Lake) for seven miles, then turn west on McLeod County Road 5 and follow the signs.

Camping

Camping at WINSTOCKI has proven to be a great way to enjoy the festival atmosphere with family and friends. Winstock camping offers primitive sites (25' x 35') with no running water or electrical hookups. Fresh drinking water and ice will be available at the main campground.

All campsites are by reservation and will be held for you. Shuttle buses to and from downtown Winsted will be provided Saturday from 7 - 11:30 a.m., on the half hour, stopping at the SuperValu parking lot, downtown corner of 2nd and Main, and the Blue Note Bar & Restaurant. Camping sites for Winstock 2016 will be available for sale at this year's event.

Unfortunately, Winstock no longer has access to the services that provided the bulk delivery of water for your camper in the campgrounds. Showers will be available at the entrance to Campground A.

A lawn chair that you bring yourself is standard Winstock seating for those with general admission tickets. Winstock will not be responsible for lost or stolen chairs. No chairs may be placed in the viewing area until the gates open Friday at 2 p.m. or Saturday at 9:30 a.m. The music area will be cleared of chairs nightly.

Gates

Gates will open Friday at 2 p.m. and Saturday at 9:30 a.m. In the event of inclement weather, the gate opening may be delayed. Parking will cost \$10 per vehicle, per day while attending Winstock. Please follow the signs to designated areas. Motorcycle parking will be available near VIP parking.


Buses

When rising country singer Michael Ray made his first exploratory trip to Nashville, he got a life-changing piece of advice from an industry insider.

Appearing

Go home.

"He said, 'Don't move. The way the music industry's going to become, you're not going to be able to get a record deal just doing a showcase anymore. You've got to bring something to the table," Ray said. "He said, 'I want to you to go back to Florida, grab a band and become the biggest you can be in Florida on your own, and then I want you to come back.' So I put a band together of friends of mine and we started to play."

Turns out it was the best thing Ray ever did. He built a rowdy fan base tilling the same fertile Southeastern soil Jason Aldean and Luke Bryan used to start their careers and returned to Nashville three years later to claim a record deal, a publishing contract, and a few unexpected opportunities along the way.

Ray has completed the journey from tiny Eustis, Florida, to the big time with the release of his first single "Kiss You In The Morning" from his forthcoming Warner Bros. Records album.

Scott Hendricks, Warner Music Nashville's executive vice president of A&R and Ray's producer, calls Ray "country with an edge."

"Michael, he's got it all," said Hendricks. "He sings well. He's a really seasoned entertainer. Girls find him not hard to look at. He's got the drive, the motivation, the work ethic, the right attitude going into this thing. He's been great to work with in the studio, just getting better and better every time we're recording. He takes it seriously, and we do have really high hopes for him." afternoon at the Winstock Information Tent. 

When brothers Jordan and Jonathan Lawson, raised in rural Missouri, met lively Arizona native Cassandra in the mountains of Flagstaff, Arizona, the foundation was laid for the adventure of a lifetime. All three classically trained students had plans of making the 2,600 mile journey to Music City to follow their dreams. But it wasn't until an impromptu concert in Phoenix that the trio realized there was an undeniable blend between their musical styles.

"The show was just supposed to be a farewell for our family and friends who had encouraged us individually to take a chance and move to Nashville to pursue country music. We had no idea that night would plant

the seed of becoming a band," said Cassandra.

In January 2002, eldest brother Jonathan was the first to pack up his little truck and make the 28-hour drive. Cassandra followed suit 6 months later, with Jordan not far behind. For the next several years, they each paid bills by working various industry jobs, playing for several country artists including Sara Evans, Josh Turner, and Lorrie Morgan.

But it wasn't until May 2008 when they met the easygoing Indiana drummer, Tyler Oban that the story was set in motion. On April 11, 2010, they all took a deep breath and a leap of faith, signing their names on a crumpled cafe napkin that said "September 1, 2010 or Bust." Vowing to quit their jobs, and start their quest to becoming full-time artists, "It was probably the scariest time in our lives, walking away from a steady paycheck and into the great unknown," vocalist, mandolin and fiddle player Jordan Lawson said.

But, so far, it's paid off. Within the first month of freedom, they landed an opening slot on Sara Evans' Fall and Christmas tour. And shortly after that, another 60-show tour was booked with an Irish starlet.

More than 200 shows and 12 months later, they were sitting in the office of the President and CEO of Sony ATV Publishing. After two songs, he wouldn't let them leave his office until a contract was in the works. By the next year, they were offered a major label record deal with Warner Music Nashville/Atlantic and show no signs of slowing down.

By combining personal lyrics, airtight harmonies and earthy instrumentation using mandolin, violin, concertina, and acoustic guitar and percussion, the group melts their energetic songs with classic groundbreaking styles of the Eagles, Fleetwood Mac, Dixie Chicks, Nickel Creek and Bonnie Raitt, leaving audiences with an undeniable sound and unforgettable live show.

If you ask Jana Kramer to describe her life in this very moment she would say, "Dreams really do come true."

The singer/songwriter/actress had success with three songs that were featured on The CW's "One Tree Hill," where she played the firecracker actress, Alex Dupre.

Kramer is also one of the most successful new female artists to emerge in the last few years. The Michigan native and actress was named the Academy of Country Music's 2013 New Female Vocalist of the Year and earned the title of the most-played debut artist at country radio in 2012. She was one of the fastest-rising debut artists of 2012, and performed hundreds of shows across the nation. Her self-titled debut album received tremendous critical praise and hit the top five on the Billboard country albums chart, while "Why Ya Wanna" reached number three on the country radio chart.

She is no stranger to the bright lights, with her impressive string of movie and television roles, but she credits her break into the music industry as her most important accomplishment to date.

"I love acting, but my heart and soul is in singing. I've been terrified to pursue this dream because it's so personal to me. If someone tells me they don't like my voice, it's a lot harder of a hit to take," Kramer said. "This is what I've always wanted to do. I've wanted to do music my entire life."

Growing up in Michigan, Kramer is no stranger to the rich history of country music, crediting one of her favorite memories to baking cookies with her grandmother while listening to Patsy Cline. Those little MAIN STAGE

moments are one of the many reasons why Kramer hopes to share her music with others. And she's doing just that as the singer-songwriter is lighting up country music with her emotionally moving songs and sweet, country vocals, selling over 150,000 digital singles in the first six months.

"Country music is in my blood. I love country music because it tells a story and I have a lot of stories to tell," she said.

Through the process of touring and recording her second album, she has also learned to believe in herself and trust her instincts.


"I will always be changing, but where I am right now is 100 percent authentic of who I am and how I perform. I am serious and I am competitive," said Kramer, who wrote six of her sophomore album's 11 songs. "I am loving and I am fun. I am very sassy and I don't back down. I still have that edge, but I am going to write songs from the heart and you're going to know who I am through every song on the album. These 11 songs on this album are me to a 'T."





Dictionary.com defines freedom as "the power to determine action without restraint."

Thus, Gary Allan's Set You Free is a perfectly-named, well-conceived album that embodies his own evolution toward personal, creative freedom. The album, sequenced with a storyline in which a man breaks the restraints of a failed relationship and conquers the loneliness of its aftermath, is the result of Allan's own journey as a man and as an artist.

"It's all about healing," Allan said. "It's all about the evolution of getting better."

He has, to be sure, drawn heavily from that viewpoint, mixing honky-tonk bravado and grainy isolation across eight previous studio albums, all the while mining the emotional turf that fuels a life well-lived: the joys of parenting, the heartache of personal loss, the testosterone of disagreement and the unpredictability of love.

"There's no better thing than to have all your best friends come over and to talk about the emotions that you're having," Allan said. "Songwriting is the best therapy in the world."

Allan is also good as new in a literal, physical way. Set You Free is the first album he recorded since the removal of a polyp on his vocal cords that had doggedly restricted his range, his strength and his expression.

The Southern California-born Allan has been exploring the thorns since the beginning of his musical life, when he played the clubs during his high school years. After graduation, he developed a following in the area, regularly attracting an audience that featured a rare mix of rednecks in western boots and neo-Goths with piercings and spiked hair.

Allan was particularly inspired in a concert by the


Highwaymen – Waylon Jennings, Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash and Kris Kristofferson – to pursue music that mined the dangerous side of life.


"They were so powerful," Allan reflects. "It was like punk rock to me. It was so hardcore. I really, really wanted to be a part of that lifestyle."

His latest album's lyrical journey from darkness to light reflects much of what went on behind it – the progression of Allan's own life as an adult, the restoration of his voice, the renewed energy from working with new songwriting partners and the challenge of producing his own tracks and playing his own lead guitar. All of those changes have given him a new sense of freedom.

"I seem to gravitate musically toward wherever I'm at in my life at that time," Allan said. "And I'm in a real good place."

These truly are golden times for Jake Owen.

And with the release of his fourth album, Days of Gold, they've gotten even brighter.

"I want people to feel more than they did with Barefoot Blue Jean Night," Jake said, referencing his watershed 2011 album, which netted him four consecutive number-one singles and garnered him the ACA award for Breakthrough Artist of the Year. "I want to be better, and I think this album for me is a great definition of who I am, but also a step forward."

A collection of 12 tracks that range from summery, salt-kissed songs to more introspective fare, Days of Gold captures Jake the artist.

"Days of Gold is definitive of all seasons, of the good times we all remember, the times with our friends," Jake said. "But it's more than that. There's so many instances that people can pinpoint in their own lives as days of gold."

Indeed, Jake's accessibility as country's every dude lends a heavy dose of charm to Days of Gold. He regularly solicits opinions from his more than 1 million Twitter followers and even enlisted them to help shape the new album. So when Jake sings, it's easy to believe he's experienced every word.

Jake emergence as one of country music's most entertaining live performers dovetails with the release of Days of Gold. His concerts – including an epic free summer block party he hosted for 20,000 fans in Nashville last summer – are thrilling affairs and he's won rave reviews from both fellow artists and industry insiders alike.

"The block party was a real turning point. People on Music Row were telling me how impressed they were when they came out of their offices and saw the streets

lined with fans waiting to get in," Jake said. "It made me feel great, because I moved here 10 years ago and didn't know anyone. And now, to stand on a stage and see that large of a crowd come to see me play? That's pretty cool."

And with Days of Gold poised to further the frenzy Jake created with Barefoot Blue Jean Night, those crowds are sure to grow even larger, including with his second performance at the Winstock Country Music Festival (his first as headliner).

"I can give people more than just music. I can give them an experience. And I want them to know that I'm passionate about what I do," the Vero Beach, FL native said. "I love this job and the people who allow me to do it are the fans. If I can help them recall past memories and feelings or make new ones, then I've done it well."





Since coming together a little over a year ago, Dan Smyers and Shay Mooney - known collectively as Dan + Shay - have established themselves as one of country music's most promising duos. With pristine vocals and a knack for writing clever yet relatable songs about looking for, finding, and losing love, Dan + Shay bring a youthful sense of energy to country music.

Their debut album, Where It All Began, harnesses that energy with 12 radio-ready tracks. The album's title comes from the last line of their debut hit single, "19 You + Me," which, upon its release, had the biggest first week by a new duo in trade publication Country Aircheck's history, was the most added debut of 2013 at country radio, and was certified Gold by the RIAA. The harmony-rich song reinvents the popular theme of nostalgia through a flurry of evocative imagery: you were California beautiful, I was playing everything but cool; it was everything we wanted it to be, the summer of 19 You + Me.

"19 You + Me' is where it all began, and those words are the last you hear in that song. It felt appropriate for our first album," said Shay, a native of Natural Dam, Ark. "These 12 songs really define us," added Dan, who grew up in suburban Pittsburgh. The pair first met during a late-night jam session at Dan's Nashville home. "They're honest, and this whole project started with Shay and I writing songs together. That's how we met. Where It All Began is the story of who we are, who we were, and who we're going to be."

Already Academy of Country Music Award nominees for Vocal Duo of the Year, Dan + Shay are following in the footsteps of their perennially lauded influences Rascal Flatts, Keith Urban and Tim McGraw. "We wanted it to be a rollercoaster of emotions and a rollercoaster of sounds, something that takes listeners on a journey," said Dan.



"We played 'Show You Off' for 10,000 people with Hunter Hayes and they all were singing the 'ay oh' chorus back to us," recalled Shay. "It was amazing."

Earning an RIAA Gold certification for a hit single, going on tour with Blake Shelton, being nominated for an ACM - they're all milestones that have become a part of the Dan + Shay story. And with the release of the hotly anticipated Where It All Began, along with a debut appearance at the Winstock Country Music Festival, the most exciting chapter is about to be written.

Sam Hunt

At first glance, Sam Hunt might seem like a fairly typical young country singer - he grew up in a small Southern town; spent his school days concentrating on sports, feeling his attachment to music grow deeper and deeper; and came to Nashville with little idea of how the music business worked, but with big dreams.

But a closer look instantly reveals that there is nothing typical about the music that Hunt makes, nor about the way he has introduced his work to the world. In a short time and on his own terms, he has become one of Nashville's most hotly anticipated new artists, and his debut album, Montevallo, delivers on the buzz and the promise - and then some.

The album follows Hunt's recent four-song album preview, X2C, led by the top-five, gold-selling track "Leave the Night On." Of course, even though he was a recording rookie, Hunt was no stranger to the country music charts, having already written hits for the likes of Kenny Chesney, Keith Urban, and Billy Currington.

Hunt grew up in rural Cedartown, Georgia. An athlete all his life, Hunt wound up playing football through college, ending his time there as starting quarterback at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Somewhere during his time at UAB, he picked up a guitar, and while learning the songs of such great singer-songwriters as Townes Van Zandt and John Prine, Hunt began putting rudimentary chords together and writing tunes of his own.

After college, the NFL had taken notice of his talents on the field and he was invited to training camp with the Kansas City Chiefs. "I knew this was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, and I needed to find out if I could take it all the way," he said. "But by then I knew that if football didn't work out, I was going to Nashville." SATURDAY 4:40 PM • www.samhunt.com Arriving in Music City, USA without a real understanding of the different paths an aspiring musician might pursue, Hunt was able to play a few of his original songs around town and was soon offered a publishing deal, enabling him to write full-time. He fell in with the songwriting community and the conventional methods of collaborating, but he knew that he was developing a sound that was slightly out of sync with the standard Nashville formulas.

"I always loved country music - I used to take the car keys from my mom and sit in our driveway listening to the car radio," he said. "But I was also hearing a lot of other music – hip-hop and R&B. In some ways, that really gospel-based Southern R&B might be my favorite of all."

His songs started to experiment with ways to mix more modern beats and tones with the narrative and wordplay that define the best country music. Some of the other songwriters were skeptical, but when Kenny Chesney recorded "Come Over" (written by Hunt along with Shane McAnally and Josh Osborne, who remain his close associates) and it became a number-one hit, he sensed that he was on to something. When the even more sonically daring "Cop Car" became a hit for Keith Urban, Hunt was convinced that he had found an exciting new direction, and began to shift his focus from being a songwriter to stepping out front as a solo artist.

Eli Young Band

Somewhere in the midst of 10,000 towns, along a lonely highway between packing clubs in their native Texas years ago and more recently performing stadiums on one of country music's hottest tours, the Eli Young Band became more than a band. They became a brotherhood. Camaraderie and creativity fused into an intoxicating cocktail that has propelled the talented foursome to the vanguard of contemporary country music.

With three number-one hits under their belts, as well as a Grammy nomination and an Academy of Country Music Award for Song of the Year for their hit "Crazy Girl," the Eli Young Band approached their second Republic Nashville album, 10,000 Towns, with a sense of confidence and purpose. "We were genuinely excited about making this new record," said bassist Jon Jones. "People talk about the sophomore record being really tough to make and, in a lot of ways, this felt like our sophomore record – even though it's technically our fifth record as a band."

"We learned over the progression of those records our strong points in the studio, and we were confident," added drummer Chris Thompson, "We knew what we wanted and how to get what we wanted." It's been a long, steady rise for Jones, Thompson, lead vocalist Mike Eli and guitarist James Young, but the same four musicians have been together from the start and are now reaping the rewards. They began performing together in 2000 while attending North Texas State University, and honed their skills on the Lone Star state's competitive music circuit by building a rabid fan base who appreciated their potent live shows and the edgy, passionate indie albums that preceded their major label ascension.

With the 2011 release of their Republic Nashville debut, Life at Best, the Eli Young Band scored their first numberone hit with "Crazy Girl." The double-platinum single SATURDAY 6:45 PM • www.eliyoungband.com

became the number-one most played country song of the year on Billboard's 2011 year end chart, and earned them the ACM Award for Song of the Year. The band's next single, "Even If It Breaks Your Heart," became their second number-one and was certified platinum.

After years of paying dues and gaining experience, the Eli Young Band is at the top of their game. While they started playing in tiny clubs, they've graduated to packing out theatres and mid-size venues as a headliner. Their road dog reputation helped them to earn an opening slot playing stadiums on the Kenny Chesney tour. All those miles on the road and visits to 10,000 towns coalesce to make their new album the band's strongest effort yet.

There have been many miles over the years for the Eli Young Band, and that's why 10,000 Towns felt like the right title for their new offering. "There's a general theme between small town America, where every town is different, but in some ways, they are the same," said Young.

The Eli Young Band has worked hard to get to this point and is enjoying their current success the same way they earned it – together.

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
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The Band Perry

Since releasing their self-titled debut album in 2010, The Band Perry has ascended to dizzying heights. Fronted by Kimberly Perry and rounded out by her younger brothers Neil and Reid, the band has notched a string of hit singles, and has enjoyed sold-out tours and a showering of honors, including multiple ACM, CMA, and CMT Music awards, as well as Grammy, Teen Choice, AMA, ACA, and Billboard Music award nominations — all of which has cemented the sibling trio as one of the hottest acts in recent history.

But despite the validation that comes with such success, Kimberly, Reid, and Neil felt as if they were walking into the unknown when it came time to write and record their second album, which they've called Pioneer.

"People hear the word 'pioneer' and they think of covered wagons or astronauts on the moon, but to us the idea of a pioneer is very modern," Reid said. "It reflects the idea of putting one foot in front of the other when you're unsure how to get where you're going. It's about marching forward and making noise."

"We had so many questions about our future, both personally and professionally," Kimberly added. "You can hear it in the lyrics to the song 'Pioneer,' which asks, 'Where are we going?' 'What will become of us?' After writing those lines, the song became our guiding light throughout the process of recording the album, which is why we chose it as the title track. It's truly about the last three years of our lives and trusting that the songs we wrote would lead us where we were supposed to go. We also had to let go of fear and trust the boldness that has always informed our creative decisions."

Taken as a whole, Pioneer enables The Band Perry to accomplish one of its primary goals: to bring the romantic mystique of bands back to music - something they've

dreamed of doing ever since forming the group in Mobile, Alabama, where the Perry kids moved with their parents after a childhood spent in Jackson, Mississippi. Kimberly started her first band at age 15, with ten-year-old Reid and eight-year-old Neil observing every rehearsal from the sidelines.

"When the drummer and bassist would take a water break, they would jump on their instruments," Kimberly recalled with a laugh. "They caught the fever immediately."

Kimberly, Reid, and Neil spent the next ten years traveling, performing, and honing their skills before signing with Universal Republic in 2009, and being catapulted into the spotlight with "If I Die Young." To this day, they are most comfortable onstage.

"Our show is very aggressive," Kimberly said. "There are a lot of electric guitars and hard-hitting drums, and the music on Pioneer captures that." "Playing the new songs has given our live show a new burst of energy, and the crowd feels it, too."

Soon enough, the crowd at Winstock '15 will feel it, too.

It's been 40 years since a trio of young cousins left Fort Payne, Alabama, to spend the summer playing in a Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, bar called The Bowery. It took Randy Owen, Teddy Gentry, and Jeff Cook six long years of tip jars and word-of-mouth to earn the major label deal they'd been dreaming of, but then seemingly no time at all to change the face of country music.

Alabama is the band that changed everything. They reeled off 21 straight number-one singles, a record that will probably never be equaled in any genre. They brought youthful energy, sex appeal, and a rocking edge that broadened country's audience and opened the door to self-contained bands from then on, and they undertook a journey that led, 73 million albums later, to the Country Music Hall of Fame and the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Alabama & Friends, a recent recording, commemorates that summer at The Bowery, and catalogues the lasting influence the group has had on generations of country stars who draw inspiration from the sparkling harmonies, irresistible stage presence and world-class songwriting and song selection that made them superstars. It brings together some of country's biggest stars, each bringing a unique musical approach to classic Alabama songs that have influenced them.

The diversity and star power of the artists speaks volumes about the breadth and depth of Alabama's legacy. Contributing their own versions of Alabama classics are Jason Aldean, Luke Bryan, Kenny Chesney, Eli Young Band, Florida Georgia Line, Jamey Johnson, Toby Keith, Rascal Flatts, and Trisha Yearwood.

"I thank God I'm here to see these great artists see fit to sing some of the songs we did," said Owen, with the Everyman sincerity that has helped so many identify with the humbly born superstars.

"It's very much an honor," added Cook, "that they'd take part in an Alabama tribute. We had a lot of fun working with them, and I think the finished product testifies to both the fun and the guality that went into it."

The songs chosen for the project represent just the tip of the iceberg that is the band's catalog, but they speak, to hear Gentry tell it, to the key to the band's legacy.

"More than anything," he said, "our longevity is a tribute to the hard work we did in selecting songs, because it's the

songs that people remember."

Capping the project are two new tracks by Alabama, songs that find the band making music that sounds both classic and relevant. They worked with legendary producer Harold Shedd, who worked with them in those golden early days and went on to discover Shania Twain, Toby Keith, and many others.

"I suggested to Jeff and Teddy that Harold work with us on the new stuff," Owen said, "and they agreed. It was spinetingling when he said yes. It's a story-book episode in my life and in the career of Alabama to have Harold being on board and to see him as excited as we were after all these years."

"We hadn't worked together in years," added Shedd, "but within a couple of hours, we had some things that sounded like Alabama did in 1980. It was like Alabama reborn."

"I always worry about putting out anything new at this point," Gentry said with a laugh, "knowing it has to stand up to a pretty strong track record," but agreed the new material does just that. He calls "That's How I Was Raised" right down the heart of the plate simple country song that showcases our harmonies," and "All American" "a song that says a lot of things that need to be said about our country."

The project came about as the trio realized their 40th anniversary was at hand.

"We got to talking and said, 'Let's do some shows and play some of the places we haven't played before, like the Ryman and the Fox Theatre in Atlanta," said Gentry.

"We kicked off the tour in Myrtle Beach and took our music back to our fans," Cook added. "We've all done enjoyable projects separately in the years since our last tour, but we all realize we're stronger as a unit."

The band was revolutionary in more than one sense.

"We were renegades in sneakers and T-shirts," said Gentry. "We had long hair and played loud, and some of the country folks resisted us for a while. But then, of course, they did accept us and then after that, our success made it lots easier for other bands to try it in country music."

The fact that some of the heirs of that legacy - Eli Young

Band, Rascal Flatts and Florida Georgia Line - are among the stars paying tribute on Alabama & Friends is part of their legacy as surely as the awards and plaudits they've earned through the years. And those, of course, have been legion. They include more than 150 major industry nods, including two Grammys, the Minnie Pearl Humanitarian award, Entertainer of the Year awards three times from the CMA and five times from the ACM, as well as the latter's Artist of the Decade award. They were named the RIAA's Country Group of the Century.

But awards are only a part of a legacy that finds its most important home in the hearts of listeners everywhere. Some of those are superstars in other genres, as Owen found out not long ago.

"I was part of a benefit concert at the Ryman," he said, "and I look over, there's Jon Bon Jovi. He walked over and said hello and it turns out he likes our music."

Many more, of course, are everyday country fans.

"A lot of fans will start a conversation with, 'I don't want to bother you," said Cook, "but what they don't understand is that everything that's happened to us, every one of those awards, happened because we've been accepted and supported by our fans."

Not long ago, Gentry was witness to a scene that shows that their legacy of song remains as fresh as it was when that streak in the '80s kicked it all off.

"I was in Nashville," he said, "walking by this club full of young people - I'm talking 18 or 20. The band started playing 'Dixieland Delight' and everybody in the place started singing and sang all the way through. I had to smile at the longevity of the songs. I think that's a tribute to the fact that we spent a career putting out good songs that stand the test of time."

With Alabama & Friends, all of us who agree get to celebrate that accomplishment and its legacy one more time. Winstock Country Music Festival organizers are honored to bring the time-tested country band to the stage to hear all the hits performed live by the men who lived them.



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An interview with Jake Owen

Minnesota will always hold a special place in Jake Owen's heart – and not just because it has treated him well in his music career.

"I come to Minnesota a couple times a year," Owen said in a recent interview. "I enjoy it every time. It's beautiful up there."

However, a couple years ago, the trips to Minnesota were less than beautiful.

Owen's father, Steve, was at Mayo Clinic battling cancer. Now, the elder Owen is cancer free, "thanks to the fine people at Mayo."

"I'm very thankful to Minnesota for taking care of my dad," Owen said.

Jake said his father had a two-year cancer checkup several weeks ago, and that he remains cancer free.

"Two years in to it, and still going strong," Owen said. "We're very thankful and blessed."

Owen's string of hits on country radio has also given him much to be thankful for. The hit "Beachin'" was his fifth number-one hit, while his most recent single, "What We Ain't Got" shows a different side of the typically fun-loving, laid-back Owen.

"I got a lot of great feedback on that song," Owen said. "It meant a lot to a lot of people, and it was a really strong song, lyrically.

The Florida native said he thinks a lot of songs take people away from real life and make them feel a fantasy listening to songs.

"That one is a pretty sobering song that brings you back to real life, and I like that," he said. "It did really well for me and I'm proud we were able to put it out."

Fans anticipating new music from Owen will have to wait – but not long. He expects to have a single from his next album out right around the time of his Winstock appearance.

"I'm excited for people to hear it," Owen said of his new music. "Hopefully, it'll be a fun, summer song – the first one we put out."


He said his new music will be a lot of the good time, fun, feel good kind of tunes that have grown from what Owen has released before.

"Something that will maintain my own brand and vibe of what I do, yet have a little different flair to it," he shared.

Developing that vibe is something that has come naturally to Owen in the past nine years, since "Startin' With Me" introduced him to country radio in 2006.

He admits it's taken a lot of hard work, traveling, and "sweat, blood, and tears," and said, "I'm still working at it, and it's still a grind and I'm still trying to get to where I want to be with not only my career, but my life, and I guess that's part of life and everyone, no matter what you do for a living, I think get up each morning, put one foot in front of the other and keep it going."

Just keeping it going led to that impressive string of number-one hits, including "Barefoot

Blue Jean Night," "Alone With You," "Anywhere With You," and "The One That Got Away."

Engagement with his fans has reaffirmed the direction his career is going and what they expect from him as a musician – and he embraces the technology that allows him to have that connection with his fans.

"I do the best I can through the social media platforms I have," Owen said. "I just think people love that. I think it's a different time in our world these days, where the first thing they do is revert to Twitter or Facebook or Instagram or something in order to connect the folks like us that people are fans of.

And vice versa. Social media not only helps Owen's fans stay connected to him – it helps him stay connected with his fans and know what they're saying about him.

"It's important for artists to use that to their best ability because it shows the fans that you care," Owen said. "I work hard and I've always wanted to do anything I could to get everything I do closer to the people who enjoy it – and I think that's a good way to do it."

Two of those people who enjoy what Owen does are his wife, Lacey, and daughter, Pearl.

"They come out as much as possible as they can," Owen said about bringing his family on the road. "My little girl started preschool here the last few months, so she stays home a little more then she used to, but it's part of her growing up and that's that cool thing. She's learning and has little friends, but I love when they come out on the road.

"It really makes me very happy when they're out here, and I miss them when they're not," Owen said.

In addition to Winstock, Owen plans to spend most of his summer with Kenny Chesney and crew on the Big Revival Tour. Then, Owen said he will kick off his own headline tour in January 2016.

"We just put a lot of pride into our show and the excitement of it. A lot of energy," Owen said. "It's all about entertaining, combined with songs l've been lucky enough to have on the radio."

At his first appearance at Winstock in 2010, he showed the crowd he means business when it comes to entertaining – even in the rain.

"A lot of the guys that were with me when we came and played in the rain there (in 2010) will be there with me this time around," Owen said. "Other than one or two people, everyone that's played



with me has been with me for a very long time."

Making the jump from opening act to headliner for Owen is, well, like most other things for him, something that's come naturally – and is appreciated.

"It's fulfilling to all of us to go back to a place we've played before, and this time be headlining," Owen said.

And to be co-headlining Winstock '15 with icons Alabama?

"I've always looked up to them as artists, and my tour manager was with them for 25 years, so it will be cool to co-headline with Alabama," Owen said. "That'll be pretty great."

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
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
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Winstock Beanbag Tournament
